CCC Structure

There are **6 Subcommittees** within the county-city CCC including:

1. Civic Fabric
2. Workforce
3. Community Voices
4. Education
5. Data
6. Government

These Subcommittees are working to develop a 2020 Census Plan of Action for Allegheny County.



Subcommittee Overview

- **Civic Fabric** - reflects the community pillars in our region, including: libraries, faith-based organizations, federally funded health centers, community centers, and civic networks.
- **Workforce** - reflects our business and labor communities including: large and small employers, labor groups, suppliers, Chambers of Commerce, etc.
- **Community Voices** - represents the groups that may be at risk of an undercount in our region, including individuals who identify as: African-American, Asian American Pacific Islander, LatinX, LGBTQIA, immigrants/internationals, older adults, disabled, veterans, formerly incarcerated, homeless, etc.
- **Education** - represents the varying levels of administrators, schools, providers, educators and students in our region, including: early childhood, K-12, after-school programs, colleges and universities.
- **Data** - reflects the analytical organizations that will leverage available datasets (i.e. American Community Survey, decennial Census information, etc.) and devise outreach efforts to support the CCC.
- **Government** - encompasses municipal representatives and leadership from both county and city departments and agencies.
